EXAMPLES of PRISON RECORDS in COUNTY CORK

(1834 - 1839)

Some years ago I was browsing through some Prison records for County Cork I stumbled across one which "caught my eye", so to speak. It was a Donovan man in 1853 and the reason he was sent to prison was for '*Furious Driving*'. Now the motor car was not around in that era so I can only guess that he was driving a donkey and cart, a horse and cart or trap. Getting a little more curious I saw a wide variety of offences many of which would not stand up in a Court today. This compilation is published in the link at the end of this document.

Soon afterwards I thought it would be interesting to view offences in years before 1840 so I took 200 sample offences for each of the years 1834 to 1839, inclusive, and below is the summary of my finding from this selected sample. I believe that I got a representative sample to give us a flavour of the "crimes" of that 5-year period.

Shortly we will view the various types of offences committed but first let us look at a few typical crimes from the period:

The following table sets out the common crime types with the corresponding number of that crime committed for the 1,200 sample covering the 5-year period 1834 - 1839. Clearly stealing is top of the list with 406 instances or 33.8% of crimes. (note: I did not do any spelling corrections to some obviously mis-spelled words in the table)
